Who We Are?

"Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center (HFC) is a Humanitarian, International and Independent Institution based in Nicosia, Cyprus. HFC was founded according to the standards and principles of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and the European Union Law. "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center works together with national, regional, and international advocacy institutions, working to reform child welfare systems on behalf of children dependent upon them for protection and care. The Organization aims to bring together judges, lawyers, psychologists, medical practitioners, mediators, counsellors, mental health workers, media representatives, child carers, teachers and allied professionals to contribute their expertise in a practical manner through education, legal advice, and other advocacy actions to promote and protect the interests of the most vulnerable amongst us - our children and youth.

Vision and Mission

The vision of "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center is to contribute to the protection and promotion of the rights of the child and to support the active participation of youth in society.

HFC's doors are open to all children, regardless of religious, cultural, and other background. HFC also aims to improve the quality of life of socially disadvantaged children, such as asylum seekers, refugees, and children in war-torn areas. Through education and social mobilization, HFC works to raise awareness and promote respect towards all cultures, religions, and diversities within society. The Organization aims to achieve this purpose through the implementation of a variety of projects at a national, European, and global level. It does so through research, grassroots program design, and implementation and advisory services offered to governments and international institutions.

Our Objectives

- Empower children and young people in Cyprus to make their views heard and to actively engage in promoting their rights.
- Educate and raise awareness regarding the suffering of disadvantaged children in Cyprus, especially of those coming from conflict-torn areas.
- Sensitize the public and enhance social responsibility in the Cypriot society through information dissemination and social activities.
- Improve the quality of life of disadvantaged children in Cyprus.
- Conduct research concerning children's rights in Cyprus and conflict areas across the globe.
- Provide policy advice and recommendations at the local, regional, and international level.
- Cooperate and establish networks with other humanitarian institutions and agencies throughout the world to defend and promote children's rights globally.

- Improve the reception of children from conflict areas in Cyprus.
- Promote volunteerism within the Cypriot community, particularly among youth, on issues concerning traumatized children.
- Support the development of new initiatives and institutions that seek to protect and promote the rights of disadvantaged children.
- Provide reports to relevant government departments to assist in policy development.
- Organize fundraising events.

How We Work

Advocacy and Policy

HFC advises on lobbying strategies and tactics, and carries out advocacy efforts in collaboration with governments, NGOs, international and intergovernmental institutions, and private sectors to ensure that the rights of the child have a prominent position in their policy agendas.

Humanitarian Affairs

HFC deals extensively with humanitarian affairs in the form of psychosocial and legal support to children in need, such as victims of abuse, unaccompanied and separated children.

Consultancy and Project Management

The Institution offers expert advice on project writing/applications, implementation, and evaluation. HFC has a wide range of partner Institutions and networks, through which it seeks to increase funding options and deliver sustainable projects to the community.

Research and Publications

HFC conducts a broad range of research of national and international interest, which is often related to its implemented projects and campaigns. Additionally, HFC compiles recommendations and commentaries for governmental and intergovernmental bodies.

Corporate Partners

HFC works closely with corporations to strengthen the capacity of the corporate sector in responding to children's rights issues and improve corporations' practices for promoting the welfare of children around the world.

Chair Establishment

The Chairs of CRC Policy Center nurture cooperation and collaborative action between Institutions around the world. In all of its activities, the Chairs act as an agent of knowledge on children's rights in policy and practice within the academic community by teaching, conducting research, and providing services to the community.

Programmes and Services

The Institution implements a multitude of programmes and campaigns, covering a wide range of topics relating to children's rights, including: child sexual abuse, bullying, child poverty, missing children, and non-formal human rights education. HFC provides social, legal, and psychological support to children and their families on such matters.

Mainstreaming

In all its work, HFC operates under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), signed in 1992. Consequently, our policy is to promote the rights of the children. According to our child protection policy, the child relation issue is one of our priorities and we pay strict attention to the situation and particular needs of each child.

HFC does not discriminate on any basis, be it gender, nationality, religion or sexual orientation. In harmony with this principle, we attach great importance to a multicultural staff environment. Several employees are from different European countries and HFC is also pleased to work with volunteers from all over the world. Similarly, in the implementation of it diverses activities, HFC fosters a mix of people, whatever their origin.

Programmes, Projects and Campaigns

Programmes

Beat Bullying Programme

The Beat Bullying Programme aims to raise public awareness in the educational community through the development of methods of identification, prevention and handling of bullying incidents, including 'cyber bullying'.

"Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center delivers seminars and trainings in schools for the establishment of peer-to-peer support and education groups with the cooperation of the Ministry of Education and Culture and the Observatory for School Violence. Moreover, the organization has developed the mobile application "HFCBeatBullying" as a tool to prevent and tackle bullying which can be used in 23 EU countries. It contains practical advice but also direct access to the European Helpline for Children and Adolescents 116111.

Specifically, the goals of the Beat Bullying Campaign are to conduct high-level research on the leading causes of the manifestation of bullying and set-up student teams for educating/training their peers to serve as role models against bullying. It involves students, parents, teachers, administration and key social organizations within the community. Teacher trainings and parent workshops are an integral part of the holistic campaign.

A relevant event regarding the Campaign was the Anti-Bullying Week which took place at the Grammar Junior School in Larnaca between 30th October and 3rd November.

CRC Campus Club

From September 2017, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center has implemented the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) Campus Club at the English School and the American International School in Cyprus. The purpose of this programme is to educate children on their rights established in the Convention on the Rights of the Child and highlight the current issues that young people face in the event that their rights are violated. Under the supervision of a facilitator from "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center, the students will explore various topics, such as 'cyber bullying', human rights violations, and gender-based violence and discrimination.

The participants commit to attending the Club meetings after classes once a week throughout the academic year. In particular, from September to December the students understand how children can exercise their rights and respond effectively to violations through experiential workshops, games, role playing and other activities, learning about the resources available with regard to the issues covered. In December, after the completion of the non-formal education training, a formal ceremony is held in which students receive certificates, establishing them as Student Ambassadors of "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center. During the second half of the school year, January through June, the students can exercise their ambassadorial skills. With the assistance of the Club supervisors, students are encouraged to create, organize, and host various events - such as workshops and awareness-raising campaigns - to educate their peers regarding what they have learned in the first part of the CRC Campus Club, as well as reaching their communities beyond the school environment. The Student Ambassadors of "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center have also the opportunity of assisting the Institution at its various events in an official capacity. Through participation in the CRC Campus Clubs, students strengthen their leadership, communication, organization, critical thinking, and observation skills, as well as professionalism.





Foster Care Programme

Foster Care Programme is a "Pilot Programme regarding Foster Care for Unaccompanied Minors, Asylum seekers/beneficiaries of international protection". The Programme, started in December 2016 and co-funded by the Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund of the European Funds Unit (90%) and the Republic of Cyprus (10%), has the aim to recruit, train, and assess potential foster parents to undertake the care of unaccompanied children in need of international protection.

Specifically, the objective is to promote the institution of foster care through the identification, evaluation, training and long term observation/monitoring of candidate foster support parents. The Programme implemented in cooperation with the Social Welfare Services which are the legal guardians of the unaccompanied children Cyprus, and as such are in charge of placing the unaccompanied in approved children families. It is worth noting that the of the Programme staff specialized comprised of professionals, registered psychologists, and social workers.

This Programme is a groundbreaking and innovative step taken by Cyprus towards the effective protection, care and reinstatement of unaccompanied children that are either asylum seekers or international protection beneficiaries in the framework of the foster family institution.

116000 European Missing Children Hotline and Cyprus Mediation Service

"Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center is jointly operating the 116000 European hotline for Missing Children together with the Association for the Prevention and Handling of Violence in the Family (SPAVO). Since September 2016, the 116000 hotline is expanded, both in the population reach and the services provided. Now, couples in conflict will be able to use the **cross border family mediation service** as a preventive or an intervention tool, whether their residence is in Cyprus or in

any other European country. The establishment of the mediation service and the training of the staff is funded by the European Commission.

Overall, families in conflict in Cyprus, will be provided with a more amicable manner of solving their differences, eliminating in this way possible harmful consequences such an increase in parental abduction rates. Through the provision of the cross border family mediation it is aimed to improve the procedures in which parents settle their in-between conflicts and to decrease the psychological harm that can be caused to the child/children

through the separation time of the family. The mediation can provide a more respectful, sensitive and impartial approach on behalf of the couples in conflict and their children, the feeling of trust; thus support and protection will be nurtured. Through acquiring mediation, children's rights will be safeguarded as well as their psychological well-being.

The type and number of persons benefiting from the project are the following: at least 6 hotline operators from HFC and SPAVO are trained and certified and also the staff of the 116000 service; a number of relevant governmental and non-governmental organizations; more than 6000 stakeholders (general public, families in conflict and representatives from relevant organizations).

Projects

CHAPTER. "Children Help Movement Against Physical Threatening and Emotional Repression"

To take the necessary steps to ensure the defence of children's rights against physical violence, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center, in partnership with PULSE Foundation (Bulgaria), EVRIS Foundation (Iceland), National Network for Children (Bulgaria) and ADFP Foundation (Portugal), has implemented the CHAPTER Project in order to create a comprehensive program of care for the empowerment of children and their parents, as well as a closed cycle of prevention, detection, guidance, rehabilitation and integration of children and young people suffering from corporal punishment (CP). Co-funded by the European Commission, the Project started on 1st December 2016 with the following specific objectives:

- > To develop a methodological approach for presenting the problem and rethinking CP;
- To raise awareness on the consequences of CP has on children and youth;
- > To explore and disseminate "best practices" at international level;
- > To coordinate the efforts of various social structures and communities to work in direction of legislative changes and virtually eliminate the issue.

The Chapter Kick-off Meeting took place on 27th and 28th February in Reykjavik. It was organized by Pulse Foundation and it was the occasion for the partners to meet for the first time face-to-face.

(Spain), aims to contribute the correct implementation Directives 2012/13/EU on the right of information in criminal proceedings, 2010/64/EU on the right to interpretation and translation criminal in proceedings and (EU) 2016/800 on procedural safeguards for children suspected or accused in criminal proceedings.

The main objective of the Project, co-funded by the

DG Justice and Consumers of the European Commission, is related to the promotion of child friendly justice by facilitating the comprehension of the information provided to the minors in conflict with the law, as well as their parents/holders of parental responsibility, through the use of a language adapted to their stage of development.

Children's House

Children's House is named after Barnahus (Icelandic for "a house for children") which is recognised as a leading child-friendly, multidisciplinary and interagency model first started in Iceland in 1998 in order to respond to child victims and witnesses of sexual violence. The purpose of Children's House is to provide each child with a coordinated and effective response through a child-friendly supporting framework, as well as preventing re-traumatisation during investigation and court proceedings. More specifically, Children's House offers a child-friendly, safe environment for children, bringing together all relevant services under one roof.

In carrying out this role, the Children's House offers a one-stop-shop approach, embracing cooperation and coordination between relevant authorities and agencies such as Cyprus Police, Social Welfare Services, Mental Health Services and Medical Services, in one child-friendly premise operated and staffed by HFC.


The Children's House also plays an important role in enhancing awareness and knowledge of sexual abuse against children with key stakeholders.

The project is funded by the Ministry of Labour, Welfare and Social Insurance with the supervision and monitoring by the Social Welfare Services.

Children's Shelters "Homes For Hope"

Since July 2014 "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center has been running, with the cooperation of the Social Welfare Services, the Children's Shelters "Homes for Hope" (Ref. CY/2015/AMIF/SO1.NO1.1.1), the first private children's shelters in Cyprus for unaccompanied children.

Given the need for accommodation and supporting a greater number of unaccompanied children, third-country nationals in Cyprus, the European Funds Unit of the Ministry of Interior published a new call for submission of proposals regarding the extension of the accommodation infrastructures. "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center, along with the Nicosia Municipality Multifunctional Foundation and Action Global Communications as partners, began the implementation of the project regarding the operation of two shelters with maximum accommodation capacity of 42 children, from November 2015 until November 2017, with the possibility of renewal for another two years. The building renovation that has taken place for this purpose, is funded by the Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (90%) and the Republic of Cyprus (10%). Also the operation expenses for both shelters are covered by the aforementioned Fund and the Republic of Cyprus.

The shelters aim to provide unaccompanied children with more than just an accommodation, which means guaranteeing multi-disciplinary and holistic services to the children that cover all the aspects of their daily lives and attend to their needs in the fullest extent possible.

The two children's shelters provide their services based on models that are considered of good practices in other EU member states and are adjusted to Cyprus standards. The referral of the children to the shelters is always made by the Director of the Social Welfare Services, who according to the National Law is the legal guardian of unaccompanied children in Cyprus. Thus, the services to the minors are provided through the close cooperation and monitoring of the Social Welfare Services. The services offered are divided and grouped under three main pillars that form the operating mechanism of the shelters: a) Rehabilitation services, b) Integration services, c) Durable solution services

CREUS. "Developing and nurturing the vocational transversal skills of disadvantaged young people through creative, non-formal learning in unconventional spaces"

The overall aim of CREUS Project is to provide a new approach focusing on 'unconventional spaces' to support the transversal skills of disadvantaged and unemployed young people (16-24 years-old) to maximise their potential in terms of fostering social, cultural and economic inclusion through access to initial VET and labour markets. Its specific objectives are the followings:

- > To design and test new structured non-formal learning activities for disadvantaged young people delivered via tutor and peer support in 'unconventional spaces', as opposed to the classroom;
- > To create an innovative series of intellectual outputs that will support tutors, trainers and peer mentors who use cultural learning in nonformal contexts and 'unconventional spaces' to engage disadvantaged young people;
- > To develop transversal and transferable skills for disadvantaged young people in order to get access to Vocational Educational and Training (VET) system and employment.

The CREUS Project, started in October 2017, is funded by the Erasmus+ Programme of the European Union, which aims at promoting the social inclusion of vulnerable young (Ref. 2017-1-UK01-KA202-036681).

CONVEY. "Counteracting Sexual Violence and Harassment: Engaging Youth in Schools in Digital Education on Gender Stereotyping"

Violence against women is a brutal manifestation of gender inequality and, above all, a violation of human rights. To address this issue, from 1st September 2016 until February 2019, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center, together with other partners from different EU countries, is committed to implementing the CONVEY Project, co-funded by the Rights, Equality and Citizenship Programme of the DG Justice and Consumers of the European Commission. Its main objective is to prevent sexual violence and harassment, and to modify violent behaviours against women in an innovative way. Indeed, the Project adopts a participatory approach which aims to empower young people between 14 and 18 years-old from grassroots through the use of new technologies as means to promote gender equality and mutual respect.

Particularly in 2017, the activities included:

- > Video with testimonials on the consequences of sexual harassment and sexual violence as experienced by women and girls developed by each partner. The videos are available at the following link: http://conveyproject.eu/videos-by-survivors/;
- Peer consultation workshops held by young people to contribute, with their perspective on gender stereotypes, sexual violence and harassment, to the development of the online simulation game;

> Expert groups to contribute to the development of the game, to learn from the experts and survivors' knowledge and experiences, to unveil the factors linked to gender stereotypes and gender roles contributing to sexual violence and sexual harassment;

Elimination of Violence against Women, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center and each partner have developed the videos about the testimonies provided by the survivors of sexual abuse in order to support the victims of gender-based violence and encouraged them to "speak up" and "say NO to sexual violence".

European Voluntary Service

The European Voluntary Service (EVS) is part of the Erasmus+, the EU Programme to support education, training, youth and sport in Europe. EVS encourages young people to participate in volunteering projects with the aim of actively contributing to achieving the goals of an organization abroad.

In 2017, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center hosted two generations of EVS for the "Home for Hope" Project at Children's Shelters and the first generation for the "Stand Up for Children's Rights, Initiative and Research" Project at the Headquarters.

EVS for "Home for Hope" Project

The EVS project (Ref. 2017-2-CY02-KA105-001082), based at the Shelters, has

developed a fertile ground for EVS activities. In particular, it aims to:

- > contribute to the rehabilitation and integration of the unaccompanied minors hosted by the Institution;
- assist with psychosocial support and counselling;
- establish mechanisms of durable solution for family tracing, assessment and reunification;
- provide non-formal education seminars and other youth initiatives in order to tackle social exclusion and discrimination, and guarantee protection and safety to the unaccompanied minors.

EVS for "Stand Up for Children's Rights, Initiative and Research" Project

In 2017, the EVS Project also started at the "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center's Headquarters (Ref. 2017-2-CY02-KA105-001081) with the main objective of fostering mutual understanding amongst diverse young people, promote tolerance and acceptance, and develop transferable skills in the field of children's rights at the level of research and designing concrete initiatives.

In particular, the Headquarters' EVS have been involved in the following specific activities:

- support and administrative activities, where the volunteers have assisted in the progress of the regular schedule and activities of the department;
- research (primary and secondary), surveys tasks, country reports about the themes and topics connected with the promotion and the protection of children's rights, gender equality and gender-based violence, bullying, child-friendly justice systems, and so on;
- development of a creative personal project related to the themes of the organization.

JudEx+. "Towards a Child-friendly Justice in cases of Sexual Violence against Children"

All children, adolescents and youth around the world, especially those who have been victims of sexual violence and abuse, should enjoy the rights conferred by the United Nation Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center in partnership with other partners coordinates the JudEx+ Project which aims at creating a plan of action to support a positive judicial experience for children victims of sexual violence.

The 24-months Project, co-funded by the Rights, Equality & Citizenship Programme of the European Commission, has the following specific objectives:

- > To promote Article 12 of the UNCRC and the Council of Europe "Convention on the Protection of Children Against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse";
- > To improve the skills of professionals involved in representing children in judicial proceedings.

The Partnership meeting took place on 15th and 16th March in Linkoping, Sweden.

Among the activities delivered in 2017, the followings:

- Development of a transnational and multidisciplinary training programme on child-friendly justice in cases of sexual violence against children for legal practitioners, police officers, welfare services' staff;
- Redaction of the Justice & Rights for Children (JRC) manual contemplating, in a child-friendly manner, information on judicial procedures and children's rights adapted to local contexts;

- > Development of a Windows mobile/desktop application, "Kiki and the Children's House", to support professionals working with young children in judicial procedures in cases of sexual violence;
- > Final national conferences.

The project is funded by the Rights, Equality & Citizenship Programme of the European Commission (Ref. JUST/2014/RCHI/AG/PROF/7036).

PROMISE II. "Commitment and Capacity Building for the European Barnahus Movement"

With the implementation of the PROMISE II project, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center and partners aim at promoting the Barnahus (Children's House) model, which has been recognised by governments, practitioners, children and care-givers as a good practice in protecting child victims. The model embraces multi-disciplinary and interagency cooperation between social services, police, prosecutors, judges, paediatrics and child/adolescent psychiatry. The project, cofunded by the European Commission, has the following specific objectives:

- > Engaging key authorities, agencies and professionals through the development of strategic national exchange, roadmap and framework;
- Improving the staff competences through tailored training to Barnahus staff;
- > Raising national and European awareness on the topic.

The project, started in December 2017, is co-funded by the European Commission (Ref. REC-CHILD-AG-2016/REC-CHILD-AG-2016-01764236).

"Social Skills Development Training"

"Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center has been completed successfully, together with the partner Nicosia Municipality Multifunctional Foundation, the project titled "Social Skills Development Training" (Ref. YE/YA/TAME/01.2016) which has been co-funded by the Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (90%) of the European Funds Unit and the Republic of Cyprus (10%). The project aimed to socially integrate third-country nationals residing in Cyprus whilst developing social skills in order to enhance their prospects of social integration in the host country and the European Union, aiming to prevent delinquency and radicalization.

More than 160 people attended the trainings, both adults and minors, and the thematic involved issues such as racism and acceptance of diversity, the role of women in European societies and gender equality, adjustment and the possibility of change through loss, the ways of communication in social environment, whilst aiming to inform and raise awareness in participants

aspects of social life and culture in Cyprus and the European Union. The training sessions included presentations and experiential workshops instructed by specially trained facilitators of "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center and the Nicosia Multipurpose Municipal Centre with the assistance of interpreters. In the sessions, non-formal learning methods were adopted, so the participants had the opportunity to more easily digest the information provided by each thematic session. With the use of experiential workshops combined with presentations, participants managed to link their own personal experiences to the subject of each training session.

SupportVoC. "Development of a Generic Support Services Model to enhance the Rights of Victims of Crime"

In order to contribute to the effective and coherent application of EU criminal law in the area of the rights of victims of crime and, in particular, to implementation and practical application of the Directive 2012/29/EU, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center and other partners, ordinated by Universitat de Barcelona, will implement the SupportVoC Project in Cyprus, Greece, Bulgaria and Italy with the following objectives:

- Developing a model and Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for generic victim support services that will be flexible and adaptable to different national or regional contexts;
- Promoting the cooperation between competent authorities and other agencies or organizations coming into contact with victims.

The project, funded by the DG Justice and Consumers of the European Commission (Ref. JUST-AG-2016-760641), had its kick-off meeting in Barcelona in November, attending by Kristina Marku, Child Protection Coordinator, Christine Mavrou, Project Officer, and the representatives of the partners.

Forthcoming Projects

* ALFACA II. "Alternative Family Care"

Through the implementation of ALFACA II project, "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center and other partners aim to support capacity building on rights of the child and child protection for practitioners and professionals working for and with migrant children in EU territory. Specifically, the project, co-funded by the European Commission, has the objectives of:

- Increasing awareness and spreading practical knowledge on the importance of providing FBC to vulnerable groups of children in the participating countries (Italy, Greece, Belgium, Croatia, Cyprus);
- Providing the possibility to set up FBC as a reasonable alternative to institutional care where it hardly exists;
- Providing ALFACA-trainings directly to professionals in several EU Member States and in the countries of partners.

The ALFACA II project is co-financed by the European Commission (Ref. JUST/2014/RCHI/AG/PROF).

INTEGRA. "Multidisciplinary Mentorship program to support the entrepreneurship of children in care and young care-leavers"

The latest approved INTEGRA Project (Ref. REC-AG-2017/REC-RCHI-PROF-AG-2017-785703) aims at raising awareness and building capacity of professionals through a holistic combination of high quality professional practices, innovative framework of working, as well as empowering vulnerable young people who are at varying stages in their process of leaving care. Specifically, the project will address capacity building of professionals working for and with children in protecting their rights through a long-term Multidisciplinary Mentorship program in order to:

- Understand children's entrepreneurship skills and effectively provide social and entrepreneurial support to children in care and young care-leavers;
- Empowering children in care and care-leavers in the context of their transition to independence through the creation of "Children in Care Consultancy Groups";
- > Establishing internship protocols in collaboration with job management centers and educators to allow the minors to learn through experience (Vocational Educational and Training VET system) before leaving the care system.

In particular, the mentorship process is rooted in the participatory approach within the "one-stop-shop" dynamic practice where the main care givers will be equipped as Leaving Care Mentor (LCM) profile.

* MEDIS. "Mediterranean Inclusive Schools"

"Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center and partners, coordinated by World University Service of the Mediterranean (WUSMED) will implement the MEDIS Project (Ref. 592206-EPP-1-2017-1-ES-EPPKA3-IPI-SOC-IN) consists of different phases carrying out to prepare the professionals from the educational settings through a structured online courses and face-to-face local workshops with experts. During these courses the school educators will acquire the required knowledge for the next phase consisting of the practical implementation of the Programme at their schools.

The following phase will be dedicated to the first round of the pilot actions aimed at validating the MEDIS Programme at several primary and secondary schools at the Mediterranean region to assess its effectiveness in these countries. It will serve as a basis for improvement in the adaptation of the Programme to the particular needs of these countries/region/localities.


Finally, final steps will be oriented at upscaling the Programme and rising awareness of the public authorities and the society in order to guarantee the sustainability of the Programme itself.

Meetings/Conferences

17th Meeting of the Lanzarote Committee

The meeting took place in Strasbourg from 1st to 3rd March 2017. The meeting took place from 10th to 12th May 2017 in Strasbourg. In addition to the monitoring of the implementation of the Lanzarote Convention by States Parties, items on the agenda also covered in particular:

- the draft Interpretative Opinion on the "Applicability of the Lanzarote Convention to sexual offences against children facilitated through the use of information and communication technologies (ICTs)";
- the draft Thematic Questionnaire to launch the monitoring round on "Criminal use of child self-generated sexual images and videos facilitated by Information and Communication Technologies";
- the situation in Hungary: analysis of the additional information requested to Hungary by the Lanzarote Committee Chairperson in a letter addressed to the Hungarian Prime Minister on 22 March 2017;

• the urgent monitoring round: exchange of views and decision on the followup of the recommendations of the special report on "Protecting children affected by the refugee crisis from sexual exploitation and sexual abuse".

Thanks to the participation of partner organisations coming from Italy, Sweden, Slovenia, Bulgaria and the United Kingdom, the event allowed the exchange of good-practices at the European level.

7^{th} Regional Consultation and 3^{rd} Policy Dialogue of Child Helplines in Europe

Child helplines, youth representatives and key stakeholders from the Region exchanged meaningful experiences around quality of data collection and building of new partnerships.

Civil society Consultation on the Global Compact on Immigration

The Cross-Regional Center for Refugees and Migrants organized two meetings in Beirut, Lebanon, in order to discuss about the Global Compact on Immigration.

The first meeting took place on 25th and 26th of July 2017 and focused on the following themes:

- · the best interest of the child;
- child protection, child labour and other risks faced by migrant children;
- the right to family life, non-separation and family reunification;
- social integration and access to social rights;
- international cooperation for protecting children's rights in the context of migration.

The second meeting took place on 24th and 25th August 2017 and revolved around:

- the labour and the human rights of migrants;
- detention practices across the area;
- how crisis affect refugees and migrants both in their home country and in host countries;
- the different state policies related to immigration;
- children on the move: educational issues, gender discrimination and integration of minors;
- reintegration in terms of voluntary return of refugees and its challenges.

The meetings were a chance to discuss about how humanitarian organisations can influence the law makers of their respective countries, so that the Global Compact

Workshops

Workshop on the role of youth work for the inclusion and participation of young refugees

The main aim of the workshop was to create a space for learning about approaches, normally used in youth work and policy for supporting the inclusion and participation of young refugees.

During the workshop, the participants had the opportunity to analyse thematic aspects which represent challenges for the lives of young refugees, as well as visiting local organizations working on inclusion and participation, and sharing good practices.

Alternatives to Detention Workshop

The workshop took place on 14^{th} December 2017 at the Cyprus Refugees Council offices.

The main topic was about how to reduce immigration detention while exploring alternative ways to it. In order to support a system which does not rely on immigration detention, researches and case studies of successful alternatives were showed. The current situation in Cyprus was also taken into account together with a focus on challenges and opportunities.

Non-formal education in schools

In 2017, experiential workshops on relevant topics/issues such as bullying, sexual abuse, human rights, children's rights, diversity, racism, volunteerism, inclusion, has been delivered in nursery, primary and secondary schools in Cyprus in order to raise awareness.

The workshops have provided for the compilation of a manual to be submitted to the Ministry of Education of Cyprus.

Trainings

Training for mediators in cases of Cross-Border Family Mediation in parental abductions

The training took place in Berlin from 3rd to 9th September 2017 and was delivered by MiKK e.V. International Mediation Centre for Family Conflict and Child Abduction. The coordinator of the Child Protection Department, Kristina Markou, and the former Policy and Advocacy Officer, Vaggelis Gettos, participated on behalf of "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center.

Training of Prospective Foster Parents

Within the framework of the "Pilot Programme regarding Foster Care for Unaccompanied Minors, Asylum seekers/beneficiaries of international protection", a training of the prospective foster parents was organised in Cyprus from May to November, through a series of experiential workshops. The content of the training has been created based on the needs of the prospective foster parents, who have been separated into two groups, the Arab-speakers and the Greek-speakers.

In relation to the first group, it was composed by persons coming from the same country of origin and the majority were relatives of the unaccompanied children (members of the nuclear or extended paternal or maternal family of the minors), who had already been assessed and had undertaken the foster care for the children. In relation to the Greek-speakers, the group was composed by people who were not related with the children and who were assessed under the framework of the Programme. The content of the training was adjusted based on the needs and characteristics of each group. Each experiential workshop composes of psychoeducation as well as experiential exercises, including discussions within the group, case studies, role plays, etc.

Transnational Training about effective implementation of the Directive 2012/29/EU for standards on the rights, support and protection of victims of crime

The Transnational Training took place on 19th and 20th October 2017 in Athens, Greece. It revolved around the importance of victim identification and needs assessment-standards and model practice, and the referral procedures. The topics were deepened with two group works concerning the institutional and multiagency approach.

The aims of the meeting were:

- > to promote and disseminate the results of the projects;
- > to facilitate the exchange of knowledge and experience among professionals in counterpart institutions in the partner countries;
- > to facilitate the creation of Communities of Practice.

2017 was also a significant year for the newly launched programs and projects, the lately approved ones, as well as the strengthening of our international network.

Moreover, it was a productive year in terms of actions abroad, since "Hope For Children" CRC Policy Center have been an active presence in several high-level meetings with partners from all over the world, sharing our vision regarding the challenges of children on the move and global care about vulnerable youth.

On the local stage, our Organization has made the choice to develop on multiple fronts and expand its services in order to reach and assist even more children and families in Cyprus.
